

# Wortham & Burgate Parish Council

Minutes of the Meeting of Wortham & Burgate Parish Council  
held on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> January 2023 in Wortham Village Hall at 7.30pm

In attendance: CC Cllr Fleming, DC Cllr Warboys and Jane Challis (Clerk)

**1. Chair's Welcome and to consider and approve apologies for absence**

Cllr Cole welcomed everyone to the meeting.

**2. To approve the draft minutes of the previous Parish Council meeting -**

2.1 Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 29<sup>th</sup> November 2022 – Approval proposed by Cllr Hovey; seconded by Cllr Bradley and approved unanimously with two abstentions (councillors who were not present at the meeting).

**3. To record declarations of Interest from members in any item to be discussed –** Cllr Cole and Cllr Williams declared a non-pecuniary interest against agenda item 11.4. Cllr Ling declared a non-pecuniary interest against agenda item 9. Councillors agreed unanimously that Cllr Cole, Cllr Williams, and Cllr Ling could participate in the discussions for the items they had made a declaration against, but abstain from voting.

**4. To consider dispensations from members in any item to be discussed –** See agenda item 3.

**5. To adjourn the meeting for public participation – 7:32pm**

**5.1 To receive residents' questions or comments –** no residents present.

**5.2 To receive reports from District & County Councillors –**

CC Cllr Fleming read highlights from her report, which had been sent prior to councillors prior to the meeting; Appendix 1. In addition, CC Cllr Fleming advised that she has written a letter of support against agenda item 11.4.

7:37pm DC Cllr Warboys arrived.

Cllr Cole proposed moving to agenda items 12 and 13; agreed unanimously.

(12. Update on School Flashing Light Units on A143)

CC Cllr Fleming reported that one of the lights is broken and a replacement due. The timing of the flashing lights will default to the county wide setting unless the school requests otherwise.

(13. Update on extending the 30mph speed limit on the Mellis road)

Progressing: CC Cllr Fleming reported that the County Council has conducted speed testing which has confirmed speeds close to 60mph on the Mellis road. Suffolk Police have confirmed their support of the speed limit extension.

There were no questions from councillors. Cllr Grocott thanked CC Cllr Fleming for all of her help with both items.

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DC Cllr Warboys read through his report, which had been sent to councillors in advance of the meeting; Appendix 2.

There were no questions from councillors and Cllr Cole thanked CC Cllr Fleming and DC Cllr Warboys for their reports.

**6. To reconvene the meeting – 7:55pm**

7:56pm CC Cllr Fleming left the meeting.

**7. To receive the Chairman's report –** a report has been received of builders parking their vans on the area of common outside the school. They are working on a site near Cherry Tree Close which it appears may be ongoing for 9-12 months. Cllr Cole has spoken to the Head of Wortham Primary School who has subsequently spoken to the Foreman, and they are now parking elsewhere.

**8. To receive the Clerk's report & o/s actions from the last meeting (For information only) –** EN020027 East Anglia GREEN EIA Scoping Notification and Consultation – the approved response from the Parish Council was submitted to the Planning Inspectorate by the 5<sup>th</sup> December 2022 deadline, and an acknowledgment received. Appendix 3.  
ESN Pylon Group Visual Impact Map – the identified locations were collated and added to the map.

**9. Aura Power Solar Farm –**

Palgrave Parish Council are keen to create a joint Working Group and arrange a date for the first meeting. After discussing, councillors agreed that they need to wait until a formal planning application consultation request is received for the proposed solar farm development, before deciding the council's collective response, and whether a Working Party is therefore appropriate.

**ACTION – Clerk to advise Palgrave Parish Council Clerk as above**

**10. Donation requests –**

10.1 Wortham and Burgate PCC requests. A request has been received from Wortham and Burgate PCCs for a donation towards maintenance of the churchyards. After discussing, Cllr Wright proposed a donation of £450 to each PCC. Seconded by Cllr Thornton and approved unanimously.

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After discussing councillors agreed that there is no reason to object to this application. Cllr Wright proposed the council support the application; seconded by Cllr Bradley and approved unanimously with 2 abstentions.

**14. Update on electricity meter at the Pavilion -**

The Clerk reported that EON have read the meter and confirmed there is a £954.00 refund due. The charges were previously being calculated on estimates. They have suggested fitting a Smart meter to ensure accurate remote readings. Pricing and further details have been requested. A surveyor from UK Power Networks is conducting a site visit tomorrow morning, due to the one scheduled for 12<sup>th</sup> December 2022 being cancelled. Cllr Williams agreed to be present for the site visit, with the Clerk.

**15. Green outside Wortham Primary School**

Further to discussions at the last meeting, Cllr Ling prepared a site plan with proposed renovations/parking improvements to the area of common land outside the school, which he presented to councillors. A lengthy discussion ensued with the following points raised: Recent weeks indicate that it is not only the school using the area for parking. Green spaces should be preserved and we should be encouraging people to walk more. There are public liability concerns against it being used as a parking area. Alternative options need to be investigated, such as a phased school drop off system, and time-controlled traffic lights which would also encourage parents to park at the pavilion instead. Could signage such as 'park here at your own risk' be erected. Could the council approach the school, and possibly immediate residents, to see if they would be interested in purchasing the area of land, and therefore being wholly responsible and liable. Councillors discussed the idea of selling, or possibly leasing, the area of land to the school or residents further, with an initial letter to the school being suggested in order to ascertain their interest. There were however concerns over the implications of the council losing control of the land, and whose responsibility it is to resolve the parking issues outside of the school. It was agreed to speak to the insurance provider regarding public liability concerns and find out more on the implications of a 90 year full repairing lease, before discussing further. Cllr Cole thanked Cllr Ling for the plans he had prepared.

**ACTION – Clerk to speak to insurance provider and look at leases as above**

**16. King's Coronation May 2023**

Councillors agreed the Parish Council will arrange an event to celebrate the King's Coronation, possibly a picnic on the common on the 8<sup>th</sup> May. The beacon will also be lit although there appears to be no official lighting of the beacons as there was for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. A Working Group will be arranged.

**17. To consider and approve Budget 2023/24**

A draft budget 2023/24 was prepared by the Clerk and forwarded to councillors prior to the meeting. After discussing, Cllr Williams proposed approval of the Budget 2023/24; seconded by Cllr Wright and approved unanimously.

**ACTION – Clerk to update and publish Budget 2023/24**

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### 18. To consider and approve Precept request 2023/24

After discussing and taking into account the approved Budget 2023/24, Cllr Williams proposed a precept request of £19,300.00 for 2023/24. Seconded by Cllr Baker and approved unanimously. Cllr Cole (Chair) and the Clerk signed the completed Precept request form.

**21. Correspondence Received –**

An email has been received from a resident regarding parking issues outside of Wortham Tea Rooms, and repairs/improvements required to the gravel track and broken signage and posts. The Clerk will advise that improvements requested by way of installation of disabled parking bays and electric vehicle charging points, are not the Parish Council's responsibility, but the repairs to the track and broken posts will be investigated and discussed further at a future meeting.

An email has been received regarding maintenance of an area of land in Long Green. After discussing, it was agreed for the Clerk to reply to confirm the Parish Council is happy for the resident to maintain the land.

An email has been received, further to the correspondence as per the minutes of 18<sup>th</sup> October 2022, regarding a community orchard and Dark Skies certification. After discussing it was agreed for the Clerk to advise the resident that due to the nature of the common land owned by the Parish Council, there is nowhere suitable for a community orchard project. Regarding the Dark Skies certification, if the resident wishes to nominate a site as a Dark Sky Place, they need to submit a written application to the International Dark Sky Association. This can be done by an individual as well as a group.

## County Councillor Report

**The 'County Deal'** – Council Leader Matthew Hicks has signed a 'minded to' agreement with Government for provisional devolution of powers and funding. If it proceeds, this would provide new money for sustainable building, regeneration of brownfield land and other areas aimed to stimulate the local economy. Neighbouring counties Norfolk and Essex have signed the same provisional agreement and we are working closely with them. The 'deal' includes acceptance of different local governance arrangements including a directly elected County leader. Details and public consultation are planned before debate at full council where a decision will be made.

**Police & Crime Commissioner precept survey** – The Police and Crime Panel is considering a proposal to raise the policing precept by £15 a year (for a Band D property) which is considered essential to maintain an efficient and effective service. **Domestic Abuse Update** - Suffolk's Violence Against Women and Girls strategy was published last year and some funding set aside for victim support and training. Domestic Abuse Champion training is free to anyone who lives or works in Suffolk. **Warm Spaces** - There are also more than 250 voluntary warm spaces across Suffolk, where residents can meet up with members of the community in a warm, safe space, at no charge. **Sunnica Solar Farm – update** - SCC has commented at the first hearing of the formal Examination process (Tuesday 6 December 2022) that the current proposal is 'not close to being acceptable'. The planning inspectorate examination concludes on 28<sup>th</sup> March 2023, during which time more sessions will be held, a decision is expected by the end of the year.

**Council Budget** – A residents' survey of council priorities conducted in October shows that adult and young persons social care are highest priorities for council expenditure, with mental health services roads and pavements, and local transport following. Under the proposals, the budget would increase by 9.6% (from £625.3m to £685.3). Additional funds would come from a total 3.99% overall increase in Council Tax, 1.99% in general Council Tax and a 2.00% increase dedicated to funding adult care. The budget will be debated at the February County Council meeting.

A Band D property would pay £28.70 per week (£1.10 pence per week increase from 2022-23).

**EAG** - A letter has been sent by the Minister of State Rt Hon Graham Stuart MP to interested parties across East Anglia impacted by new transmission infrastructure, offshore wind connections, or interconnector projects. This letter has been sent separately to the parish council. It addresses:

1. A review of *existing* connections in East Anglia: - requested by MPs but will not take place as;

*"In most cases, offshore wind developers in the region already have connection contracts in place with National Grid Electricity System Operator (ESO) and the Government will not, and cannot, force changes to these contracts; any attempt to mandate changes to connection contracts at this stage would be open to legal challenge by developers"*

2. Revised Energy National Policy Statements (These policies set out how the Secretary of State should determine applications for energy National Infrastructure Projects such as, pylon lines, windfarms and Interconnectors, when they are in the scope of the Planning Act 2008).

*"Our proposed changes to National Policy Statements (which set out the expectations against which planning proposals are tested) will strengthen emphasis on the coordination of transmission infrastructure and include the need to demonstrate a reduction in environmental and community impacts through coordination. Communities will be able to respond to the consultation on these changes in early 2023. Following the consultation, the revised documents will also need to be approved by Parliament, ensuring full democratic accountability both locally and nationally."*

3. Reducing onshore impacts and supporting coordination by voluntary means

a) *Nautilus Interconnector*

*"In recognition of the significant volume of infrastructure planned for development in East Anglia, my Department is working closely with developers to encourage voluntary coordination of connections for projects that already have grid connections. This could reduce landing points in East Anglia, and we have already seen progress. National Grid Ventures has confirmed it is investigating an alternative brownfield connection point for their Nautilus multi-purpose Interconnector, on the Isle of Grain in Kent, as an alternative to Friston, Suffolk."*

b) *Coordination of offshore wind and interconnectors*

*"I launched the Offshore Coordination Support Scheme(OCSS). This is an open competition grant scheme with up to £100m available, targeting well advanced offshore wind and certain offshore energy assets (such as interconnectors) in Great Britain.*

*It will provide funding to successful applicants to develop feasible coordinated designs for their transmission infrastructure, which could reduce connection infrastructure. We are engaging with developers in East Anglia who we hope will apply. The scheme will close for applications in February 2023, with funding allocated by the middle of 2023"*

4. A review of *revised* connections by National Grid

Given the potential outcomes of achieving coordination through incentivised voluntary means and the potential alterations to connection arrangements

*"The Electricity System Operator (ESO) is exploring how it could undertake a study into the implications of coordination on the network, onshore and offshore, in and around East Anglia. This study would be independently conducted by the ESO It is important to note that this would follow on from the conclusion of the OCSS grant scheme."*

5. Community Benefits



*“While steps are being taken to coordinate and reduce infrastructure where possible, new infrastructure will be needed. Communities that host network infrastructure are playing a vital role in enabling a cheaper, cleaner and self-sufficient energy supply for Britain and it is only right that they benefit from this. A consultation on gov.uk is planned in the first quarter of 2023 on community benefits for communities hosting onshore transmission network infrastructure”*

6. The future role of the Minister of State will be changing

*“Given my intention to engage actively with local MPs, developers, and other interested parties on all of the issues here, I should make clear that I will not be the decision-taking Minister for these forthcoming planning applications in East Anglia”*

7. Future meetings with MPs and project developers

*“Last month I met with East Anglian MPs and separately with developers of projects in the region, to understand community concerns and encourage efforts to reduce infrastructure. I will be meeting with both groups again on this matter early in 2023.”*

Support for children during the school holidays.	<p>Our capacity to support these children during the holidays comes through the Holiday Activities and Food Programme, through national government. The Communities Team has run very successful HAF programmes during the summer by encouraging a wide range of providers across the district to offer activities including healthy food for those attending, with a key focus on children in receipt of free school meals. We have worked hard to encourage more providers to deliver activities during the Christmas holidays but there is a limited capacity for organisations to take part, resulting on fewer programmes available during this period. We have supplemented the activities with food hampers, which are being distributed across Eye, Stowmarket, Needham Market, Woolpit, Elmswell and Thurston. In particular Everyone Active are providing family and Teen swims (both centres) and The Mix are providing their activities in Stowmarket and in their new Needham Market base.</p> <p>There are 2220 children who are registered for free school meals in Mid Suffolk.</p>
